It occurs to me that Leong's question serves us well as we examine all of the "neighborhoods" we inhabit.


How far outside of your religious "neighborhood" do you have to travel in order to feel discomfort?

Politics, Fear, and Scripture

If I were to ask people to make a top-10 list of things they would rather not talk about at church, my guess is politics would be at the top or near the top of most lists. I suppose politics has always been a taboo topic for most individuals and families, which is disheartening on a number of levels. Conversation about politics should be welcomed as an opportunity for us to engage important topics that impact each of us. While we may disagree on certain issues, that should not discourage us from fellowship with one another. In fact, it should do quite the opposite. If it were not for family members and friends who challenged me over the years, I would never have arrived at some of the convictions I hold today. We need each other in order to grow in our understanding of that which shapes and impacts us and our society.


Perhaps the reason we are so reluctant to have these conversations is due to fear. After all, it is awkward to sit in silence at the dinner table because someone thought it was a good idea to talk about gun control, immigration, or another hot topic issue. And while fear is what often keeps us silent, it is what also allows anger, bitterness, and resentment to build over time. If we stay silent for too long, bottling up our thoughts and feelings due to fear, it has the tendency to spill over into rage, resulting in the tribal nature we see so often in the current political climate. It is

our fear that keeps us isolated from one another, allowing us to turn neighbors into enemies, friends into opponents, and family into strangers. Fear can get the best of all of us if we allow it, and when it does, it can spread like wildfire.

That's why in our three new Sunday Bible Study classes we are discussing politics and fear and what scripture tells us about God's concern for these issues. In our classes, we are talking about these topics because they matter. And they matter not only to us, but to God as well. Deciding to talk about these matters is the first step in creating authentic community, where we are willing to listen and share with one another, even if we disagree on certain ideas. Being able to do this in Sunday Bible Study affirms our commitment to trusting God's guidance in these important matters, for we know we cannot navigate the complexity of these issues by ourselves. As we finish our current studies and begin new studies in October, I hope you will make a commitment to join us in these conversations that matter. And I pray that as we engage them together, we will grow deeper not only in our faith, but in relationships with one another as well. See you Sunday!

Celebrating 10 Years with the Shapards

Who would think that a little old Baptist church would have the bravery, the willpower, and the pure, gut-wrenching FAITH, to call a music minister when it had no sanctuary, no hymnals, no organ, no choir robes, very little music—almost nothing with which to support a worship service, not even a baton for the director, all having been completely destroyed by fire one year earlier? But HAB did—and furthermore, it landed THE BEST in the land.

Tommy Shapard, in a huge leap of faith and an innate, unshakeable belief in what COULD be, took the job in October 2008 in the face of multiple complications and obstacles, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Tommy and Rachel and their family of one beautiful little boy, Drew, arrived in Jacksonville just in time for Tommy to participate in the groundbreaking ceremony for our new sanctuary. The date was October 5, Tommy's very first Sunday on the dais as official Minister of Music and Worship. The choir sang John Leavitt's "Festival Sanctus" and Mark Hayes' "Then Will the Very Rocks Cry Out." Rachel and Tommy also sang an arrangement of "Here I Am, Lord."

Most of us at HAB know that Tommy is mid-way through his Doctorate of Pastoral Music from the Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, where he is researching innovative practices that will help pastoral musicians thrive in the early 21st century. Not all of us know, however, that he holds two and a half Master's degrees. He has a Master in Music Performance with a specialization in conducting from the University of North Florida and a Master of Divinity from Candler School of Theology at Emory University with an emphasis on worship, justice, and Baptist studies. The "half" was a Master in Music at Florida State University with specialization in ethnomusicology—the thesis remained unfinished because he enrolled at Emory's Candler School of Theology in Atlanta, where a spectacular redhead was living and was enrolled at Mercer's McAfee School of Theology.

Actually, the spectacular redhead—Rachel Gunter—was only partially responsible for Tommy's change in geographical direction. His focus was changing direction, too, and was leading him toward the concrete practices of music and worship and their ex-

tensive, wide-ranging ramifications for the Church

By the time Tommy got to HAB some five years later, we were the beneficiaries of a wonderful "two-fer"-not only did we get Tommy, but we also got Rachel Gunter Shapard, M.Div. Reverend Rachel is the Associate Coordinator for the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of Florida and the Caribbean. She also graces our congregation with her excellent preaching from time to time, she participates fully in our church life, and she sings with the Sanctuary Choir, sharing her soaring, beautiful soprano nearly every Sunday and on special occasions. Who can ever forget her rendition of "The Tenebrae Song," one of HAB's most beloved Good Friday traditions, that annually leaves us in tears?

Tommy is a native of Raleigh, North Carolina, but grew up in Ft. Worth, Texas. He is a 1997 magna cum laude graduate of Baylor University (thus, a Baylor Bear, like Kyle and Hannah, and equally insufferable). At Baylor, he was inducted into several academic honor societies, won the Annual Senior Award for Outstanding Music Educator, was on the Dean's Academic Honor List, won multiple scholarships, and was a finalist for the award "Top Five Sophomores" in Baylor's School of Music.

He was equally accomplished at FSU, inducted into the Phi Kappa Lambda National Music Honor Society and awarded a graduate stipend and scholarship for all three years in Tallahassee. At Emory, he was a Cooperative Baptist Fellowship Leadership Scholar, an Honor Scholarship recipient, and won the scholarship that is presented to the rising senior who shows exceptional promise in the Baptist tradition.

And HAB got him! Before we got him, however, Tommy served in several churches in various positions, all related to music: Choir Director at Gray Memorial United Methodist in Tallahassee; Assistant Director of Music at Cannon United Methodist Church, Snellville, Georgia; Assistant Minister of Music at First Baptist Church in Gainesville, Georgia (where he was officially ordained into the ministry in 2005); and lastly, as Pastor of Music and Worship in Lubbock, Texas, from whence he came to HAB.

Tommy's enormous talents burst at the seams, as anyone who has been around or

worked with him knows. In addition to his full-time position at HAB as Minister of Music and Worship and the extensive music programs he has established and supports for HAB, Tommy is a part-time instructor on the music faculty at UNF and has written a sacred music curriculum now in use there, the graduates of which earn a Certificate in Sacred Music. He has conducted the Men's and Women's Choruses at UNF in the past, and still conducts the 5 O'Clock Singers. He serves as the Director of Choirs at Florida State College at Jacksonville (FSCJ) and worked for five years as a member of the Jacksonville Children's Chorus Artistic Staff (in which sons Drew and Mac sing).

Selfishly for us, one of the greatest benefits to HAB of Tommy's community involvement is the greatly increased exposure of our church within the community and as a vivid source of spiritual witness in the many forms that our music takes. We at HAB have stated that we believe it to be our mission to offer our music to the public in the form of our widely varied special programs and performances, and conversely, we attract through our doors absolutely wonderful musicians of all genres and talents. It is a win-win for HAB and for the community.

Rachel, a native of Tallahassee and a Florida State grad with a B.A. in Music in addition to her Master of Divinity from McAfee at Mercer, brings her own wonderful gifts to HAB, as do the two lovely children who have arrived since the Shapards moved to Jacksonville. Kate is now an astounding nine years old and in the third grade at Pine Forest School of the Arts; Mac, believe it or not, is seven, and in the second grade, also at Pine Forest. Drew, only two when they moved here, is now 12 and in the seventh grade at LaVilla School of the Arts and will soon see eye-to-eye with Tommy in height.

While the Shapard family is a common sight around HAB, the kids blasting through doorways and down corridors—Tommy and Rachel ditto, though at perhaps a more sedate pace—the Shapards are nevertheless an extraordinary family, and we know we are uber-fortunate to have them. We have loved and valued them for 10 years and pray we'll get to do the same for at least 10 more.

What the heck, let's hope for 20 more!
