Lenten Discipline

We enter into the Lenten season with conversations about moving closer to God, fasting, exercising, reading Scripture, whatever it may be for you. Lent is a season of discipline. But in order to fully grasp that concept, we have to understand what Christian discipline requires of us. We are not talking about a militaristic, fearful discipline. Christian discipline draws us closer to God—closer to who we truly are in Christ.


Lent invites us into the space of penance, of giving up things to create a way for us to grow closer to God. But if we are not careful, we can simply slip into the pattern of discipline for discipline's sake. We must wake up every morning and read for an hour; we must go on a 30-minute walk at lunch—we must, we must. But we forget the second half of those statements. We wake up early and we get to sit in silence and read a devotional. We go for a 30minute walk and we get to pray and meditate, drawing us closer to God.

Our Lenten journey helps us build a restorative relationship that we can only find in Christ. It is the feeling

when you get to hold your grandchild for the first time, when you get the first glimpse of your bride as she walks down the aisle. It is that time when you land the dream job and everything you have worked so hard for has come to fruition. It is the feeling that who you are is perfectly defined and realized in that moment.

Our discipline should bring us to that feeling on Easter morning—the feeling that our identity is completely wrapped up as a child of God. We can only get to that feeling when we practice a disciplined life that is wrapped up in drawing closer to God by praying, reading, silence, or whatever it may be for you. Our Lenten journey invites us into that space; it invites us to recognize that we are better and we can do better.

We have an invitation to find rest in Christ, and it is up to us and our community of faith to step into this invitation ready and willing to find our identity in Christ. What a journey we get to go through Lent to find ourselves—to find rest! Are you ready?

Martin, a teenager who simply wanted to be left alone, remind me that in this country...life is about access. It is an unnerving and relentless practice that has affected the physical, social, emotional, and spiritual well-being of not only the men in this story, but also the women that they leave behind. These women— mothers, grandmothers, and daughters—continue to exist in the spaces that these men once occupied. This body of work highlights the stories of the women of *Screams Echo*—Granny, and her granddaughters Rita, Frances, and Simone, each living with the physical and emotional trauma passed on through generations of witnessing these physical and psychological lynchings of the men they know and love.
