Advent & Christmas By B. J. Hutto, Pastor

Friends,

I think either my calendar or my thermometer's broken because the one keeps trying to tell me that it's November, but the other says that, outside, it's 80 degrees!

I've said this before,

but Rebekah and I used to joke when we lived in New York that for all the pairs of boots that Hannah Ruth had up there—rain boots, snow boots, insulated boots, and so on her cousins in Florida had an equal number of flip flops. And now that we're here and it's 80-plus degrees in November, we're making that transition ourselves. I told someone the other day that it'll be bizarre singing "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" in a pair of shorts, but as I write you this morning, that day is approaching very soon.

Because Advent is almost upon us, I wanted to take this opportunity to update all of you on HAB's Advent and Christmas worship plans. Just as on Sundays—and just as in all other areas of our lives—these plans reflect the reality of life under COVID and our church's abiding commitment to do all that we can to keep ourselves and our brothers and sisters safe. But we believe that they are good plans and that they will still offer opportunities for meaningful, worshipful community during this season.

SUNDAY BIBLE STUDY

During Advent, Tommy Shapard and Janet Metcalf will be offering lessons on four well-known Advent hymns: "Joy to the World"; "Star Child"; "O Come, O Come Emmanuel"; and "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing." As Baptists, so much of how we understand God and God's love comes from our beloved hymnody, so learning more about these texts will be both enjoyable and enriching. These lessons will be prerecorded and available online each weekend so that members can engage them on their own time and then come together to discuss them, over Zoom, at 8:00 a.m. on Sunday mornings. THE LONGEST NIGHT

On the night of the winter solstice, December 21, HAB members will have an opportunity to step away from the bright lights and celebrations of the Christmas season and use the church's sanctuary as a space to grieve, to remember, to heal, and to hope. While for many the Christmas season is a time of joy, for a number of us it is also a time when space is needed for more somber reflections. Therefore, on the longest night of the year, the church sanctuary will be open from 4:30-7:30 p.m. for self-guided prayer, petition, and reflection (we are opening it this early for those who would be uncomfortable driving home after dark). There will be appropriate music throughout, and handouts with prayers and litanies will be offered. In addition to this, from 6:00-<u>6:30 in the sanctuary there will be a brief "Longest Night"</u> liturgy for those who want a more guided, communal time of reflection. I know that HAB has had services like this in the past, so all of you already know their value in our lives, but this service feels particularly appropriate this year due to the pandemic and the loss of life that we and our world have suffered.

CHRISTMAS EVE

As always, on December 24, our church will celebrate with two services. Again, though, because of COVID, these services will not look like they have in the past. Just like on Sunday mornings, they will be identical to one another, and because they will need to be

accessible for the entire congregation, the late service will not be as late. Therefore, this year our Christmas Eve services will be at 5:00 and at 9:00 p.m. Because it's hard to do a socially-distanced nativity, both services will be services of lessons and carols, but they will be shaped so as to be more welcoming to children. Also, we are preparing to have both services outdoors. We are working on appropriate lighting (that can be dimmed as we light candles), we have ordered space heaters to use if need be, and we will have stations set up for apple cider and hot chocolate. If the weather is poor, then we will go into the sanctuary, but holding these services out of doors will add one more layer of protection over them. Thus ours will be a different Christmas Eve celebration than in years past. However, I can tell you that the more we talk about it as a staff, the more excited we are to see how it turns out!

Once again, we are grateful for the chance to lead and to serve alongside all of you, and we are grateful for your patience, good nature, and diligence as we navigate these times together. And above all, we look forward to celebrating Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany with our HAB family and proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ before our neighbors!

Trying Something New By Britt Hester, Minister of Youth and Christian Education

On Sunday, October 4, we resumed in-person worship on the HAB campus with specific safety guidelines and precautions in place for COVID-19. I believe it is safe to say that our in-person worship has been successful

thus far, and the ability to see and interact with one another, albeit socially distanced, has been good for our proverbial souls. I am grateful for this new reality, and I hope we are able to continue gathering safely without any setbacks.

With that in mind, we also made the difficult, yet necessary, decision to pause Sunday Bible Study in order to focus on our regathering elements and to give our Sunday Bible Study Leadership Team time to reconvene. During this hiatus we used our time to evaluate how to best offer Sunday Bible Study lessons in a way that is easily accessible *and* provides the best opportunity for fellowship and dialogue. After several meetings, we feel we have arrived at our best option.

Beginning on November 29, the first Sunday of Advent, we will roll out a new structure that we hope provides the best of both worlds that we have experienced recently. Over the past eight weeks, Susan and Joe Stepp led a series entitled "A Life of Faith: Lessons from the Psalms." They did a tremendous job preparing these prerecorded lessons, and the feedback we received suggested many would like to see these pre-recordings continue. The only negative feedback we received was that many missed the online interaction of Zoom to discuss the lessons, pray for one another, and generally interact. Beginning on November 29, this option will be available.

During Advent, Tommy Shapard and Janet Metcalf will be leading us in Sunday Bible Study by highlighting four traditional Advent hymns ("Joy to the World"; "Star Child"; "O Come, O Come Emmanuel"; and "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing") while connecting them to their biblical origins. The lessons will be pre-recorded and posted each Friday on Facebook, YouTube, and Vimeo. You can access these lessons at any time prior to Sunday. On Sunday, there will be a Zoom meeting at 8:00 a.m. for those interested in discussing the lesson, praying for each other, and catching up prior to worship at 9:00 a.m. The Zoom link is

Our hope is that this will give you the flexibility to interact with the material at your convenience while also providing you with the opportunity to connect with fellow church members on Sunday. We realize some are not able or comfortable attending in-person worship yet. This gives *everyone* in our congregation a chance to study the material at their leisure while simultaneously providing a way for us to share life together in this time of COVID.

Thank you for your prayers and support in this process. My prayer is that this will continue to bless you and your family as we continue navigating this challenging time together. We have journeyed together this far, and I have no doubt we will continue to grow and strengthen one another in the days, weeks, and months ahead. I look forward to walking the road with you.

Kitchen Korner

Happy Holidays! As I write this we are preparing for Thanksgiving, and as you read this we will be in the midst of the Advent and Christmas season. Even though we are challenged by the COVID-19 pandemic, it is a blessed time—a time to give praise, reflect, and celebrate the birth of our Savior.

One of my favorite things this time of year is the return of everything pumpkin. You know, pumpkin pies, pumpkin muffins, and best of all Cremora Pumpkin Spice coffee creamer, sugar-free. It is hard to find but so worth it if you love pumpkin. Pumpkin is not only a distinctive flavor; it is also good for you. Pumpkin, along with all the other winter squashes, is full of vitamins and minerals to boost your immune system during these winter months.

We have made more than 400 desserts in the HAB kitchen in the last 14-15 years. If we were cooking this week, what would dessert be? I think it might be pumpkin! We get a lot of good recipes from a book called *The Cake Mix Doctor*. A good recipe is one that can be made by a novice cook/baker, has readily available ingredients, and can be multiplied up without changing the quality. This cookbook fills the bill with Pumpkin Spice Cake. It will stand alone with a dusting of confectioner's sugar or be incredibly special with buttercream or cream cheese frosting sprinkled with toasted, chopped pecans. You might turn it into muffins/ cupcakes and add chocolate chips and/or chopped pecans or walnuts.



Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Lightly mist a 9" by 13" baking pan.

In a stand mixer or a large mixing bowl (with a hand mixer), add the cake mix, pudding mix and all the other ingredients. Mix well for 1-2 minutes. Scrape down the sides of the bowl and beat for 2 more minutes, scraping the sides again once or twice. The batter should look thick and well-blended.

Pour the batter into the prepared pan and smooth it out with the spatula.

Bake 30-35 minutes. When done, the cake will have slightly pulled away from the sides of the pan and spring back when lightly pressed with your finger in the center of the cake.

Cool completely. If desired, frost with one of the suggested frostings and sprinkle with the chopped nuts. Cut into squares. Enjoy the pumpkin season!
