While I find it hard to believe that the holiday season is now upon us, I am very excited that we will all have the chance to celebrate Advent and Christmas together this year. While last year was special, our celebrations—both at HAB and also with family and friends more broadly—were impaired by a pandemic that was still surging around us. And while the threat of COVID-19 has not completely disappeared, due to rising vaccination rates within our community this year we are in a much better environment to come together and celebrate the love of God as it is shown to us in the advent of Jesus Christ! Therefore, please be sure to look on page 2 of this month's *Herald* for an introduction to the

upcoming opportunities for worship and fellowship: concerts, Christmas parties, mission opportunities, you name it!

I also want to take a moment to highlight three of these opportunities. First, just as we did last year, on the night of the Winter Solstice, **December 21**, HAB will again host a "Longest Night" observance. As in years past, this service will give each of us individually—and our church family collectively—a chance to step away from the hustle and bustle of the season and reflect on those areas of our life together that still bear the scars of sin and brokenness. Like last year, the sanctuary will be open from 5:00-6:30 p.m. for a time of private reflection and prayer. We will have ministers available for anyone who would like to be prayed with, and we will also have reflective piano music playing throughout this time. Please feel free to come and go as you are led. Then, at 6:30, there will be a brief corporate service where we will turn to our Lord together in grief, remembrance, and hope.

Secondly, at 5:30 p.m. on December 24, our church will gather all together to celebrate Christmas Eve as one family. Through deliberations as a staff and conversations with lay leaders, it was decided that, instead of having different services at separate times, this would be a good year to come together as one, celebrate as one, see one another, and with one voice give thanks to God for the gift of Jesus Christ. No longer needing to socially-distance—and without any kind of mask-mandate upon us—our hope is that this will be a joyous, celebratory time as we connect with one another and reconnect with friends and family who have traveled home to celebrate!

Finally, I also want to highlight that, on **Sunday, December 26, at 10:30 a.m.** our combined worship service will be led by **Maddie Weise**. If you were around for Maddie's sermon on Youth Sunday, then you know how wonderful it was, and I am very much looking forward to hearing her preach again! Because of where it falls on the calendar, the service that morning will be joyous but also relaxed, so please plan on being there on that First Sunday of Christmas, supporting her in her leadership, and giving thanks for the greatest gift that any of us could ever receive!

A Note of Thanksgiving

When Laraine told us our *Herald* articles were due this time, I was not sure what to write. Sometimes even we ministers run out of things to say. But I started thinking and the first word that popped into my mind was thanksgiving. Perhaps that is because as I write this article, we are only a few weeks out from celebrating actual Thanksgiving. Or perhaps it is because as I reflect on the past year, I cannot help but be thankful for so much.

It is not a secret that this past year—really the past two years—have not been easy for any of us. We all have stories, trauma, and scars from what has taken place. But I recall a quote I overheard once on the show *Criminal Minds*. Detective Dave Rossi, played by Joe

Mantegna, says, "Scars remind us where we've been. They don't have to dictate where we're going."

There are times when I find myself wishing the past two years away. While I had some high moments such as the birth of our son Micah, our youth trip to North Georgia, and reconnecting with many of you, most of my experiences were not pleasant. Like many of us, I have come out of this season exhausted and delirious. Yet, as I sit here today, I cannot help but be thankful for all that I have encountered and endured. While it has not been easy, it has been illuminating, challenging, and clarifying. And while they are not wrapped in a bow and placed beneath a tree, these are the gifts of struggle.

Sometimes pain, grief, and hardship reveal to us a path. Like a machete clearing the way along an overgrown trail, strife has a way of unveiling things we did not know existed within ourselves. Or perhaps it removes the elements that keep us blind or hidden from seeing our true selves. Whatever the case, rarely do we hear someone say, "I was the same after adversity." While it is not delightful, adversity makes us stronger. Struggle unites and inspires us to overcome together. Hardship makes us mindful of what is truly important; it forces us to reevaluate our priorities.

While none of us would like to revisit the past year or two, perhaps we will spend time recalling the moments we endured to get to this point. Perhaps we will take inventory of our lives and wonder what lessons we have learned and how we have grown and changed as a result. Perhaps we will remember that we might have scars, but they do not have to dictate where we are going. And I have a feeling if we do, we might just see the hand of the One who promised, "I will never leave you nor forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5). Thanks be to God.



Music and Worship

Whew! We have been busy these past several weeks. From the amazing efforts celebrating the 75th anniversary to working through the latest season of a two-year pandemic, many in our church are contributing to a reenergized congregational life at HAB. Our work, while not perfect, is sacred and significant. Thank you, HAB, for all you are doing right now in these days as we head into Advent and Christmas.

In the area of music and worship, I am thrilled to see more members of the Sanctuary Choir in the loft on Sunday mornings. Wednesday night rehearsals are filled with more sounds, laughter, and people traffic than they were a year ago. Our HAB choral community is reforming, and this is good. These are significant moments we do not take for granted any

longer as we steadily regather from the scattered corners of pandemic life. For now, we continue to distance, mask, and limit rehearsal time to one hour, following guidance from the professional choral world. Rehearsal remains in the sanctuary for more space and better ventilation. We continue to monitor all numbers and guidance for choirs, hoping that soon we might inch toward mask-free choral singing. The choir understands firsthand how quickly COVID-19 spreads, as more than a dozen HAB choir members were infected following rehearsals in late-February, early-March of 2020, spreading the infection during that time to others in the congregation.

As we head into Advent 2021, I am thankful for a full force of singers. I am thankful for activity and life moving forward while also remaining reasonably cautious. I am thankful that the choirs, including children and youth, will sing extra music throughout the season. Bells will be ringing, and instruments will sound. The sanctuary will transform, and candles will be lit. Preparing for Christ's presence in our lives will be met with beauty and anticipatory hope.


A warm welcome to our new members **Nancy and Al Ricker**.







December 15: Chicken alfredo, broccoli, salad, strawberry cake. Kids' meal: chicken nuggets, fries. December 22 & 29: No meal.



Apple Dip

 1/4 cup sugar
 3/4 cup brown sugar
 8 ounces cream cheese
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1/2 cup chopped, toasted pecans Process first three

Georgia Rocky Road

16 ounces almond bark
½ cup creamy peanut butter
½ cup crispy rice cereal
8 ounces unsalted peanuts
1 cup mini marshmallows

Place the almond bark in a microwave-safe bowl. Cook on high for 30 seconds. Check and stir. Cook for 30 more seconds. Check and stir. Heat a few more seconds, if necessary, until mixture is melted and smooth.

Stir in peanut butter. Stir in peanuts. Stir in rice cereal. Fold in marshmallows.

Using a tablespoon, spoon little blobs onto a cookie sheet. Refrigerate until firm, 15 minutes or so. Package in a festive bag and share!
