One aspect of church life that every congregation has trouble figuring out is how to communicate the breadth of its life across its membership. Some of you might've heard me compare a church's life to the ancient parable of the blind men and the elephant. Feeling around in the dark, each man only touches one part of the elephant's body—the ear ("a sail!"), the trunk ("a snake!"), the tail ("a rope!"), a leg ("a tree!")—and is therefore convinced that an "elephant" is like only that part that they've felt. That's what a church is like, too: a complex community that's more than its worship life, or its Bible studies, or its youth and children's programs, and yet—because so many people only ever come into contact with one or two of these areas—all the many ways that the

church contributes to its family and its community can easily go unknown or unappreciated. This, by the way, is why gifts like *The Herald* are so important. They're opportunities for our congregation to learn about areas of our life together that they might not otherwise come in contact with!

Today, I want to share one of those areas with all of you. It's a story that some of us know, but it's also one that *all of us should know*, because it demonstrates a deep part of who HAB really is. For several years now, our church has been helping a neighbor of ours whose housing and home life have been terribly unstable. I could tell you any number of things about him—he grew up in the neighborhood, played ball at HACAA when he was young, served in the military including several tours in Iraq—but, at base, the most important thing about him is that he's a neighbor of ours who's needed help.

For several years now, we've helped him along and along, but two months ago he called and let us know that he had finally found permanent housing and would be able to move in sometime in September. This was a big deal! But there were two problems. First, while he has a steady income from his disability, between putting down the deposit on the apartment and paying to have the electricity turned on, he had tapped out all of his money. And secondly, while he had finally secured an apartment, it wasn't coming furnished, and the only things that he owned were his clothes.

Finally having somewhere to live, of course, was a huge deal—a roof over his head, a reliable shower and bathroom, heat and AC for the weather, and so on—but this man finally had an opportunity for life to be more than that. He had a bedroom but no bed to sleep in. He had a kitchen but nothing to cook with, nothing to eat with, and (for that matter) little to no food to cook or eat!

And this is where HAB—not the staff but the congregation—comes into the story. Working with Caroline Welkley, church members rallied and helped this neighbor of ours fill out his new home. Money was found to help him get through the weeks until his next check came. One church member secured a table and chairs for him to eat at. Another donated a bed and mattress for him to sleep in. One of our Sunday Bible Study classes took it upon themselves to equip his kitchen: plates, cups, utensils, pots, pans, a microwave, and on and on. Caroline, for her part, is continuing to help him navigate the Veterans Affairs system so that he has access to his full complement of benefits through it. While this gentleman gets all the credit for finding and securing his new home, there were some things that he simply could not do for himself, and our family was able to step in and help. What's more than that, though, is that our family was *willing* to step in and help, materially: to donate furniture and figure out how to deliver it, to collect kitchen items and stock his shelves. And that says something about who we are!

My friends, this is one instance where I can genuinely say that HAB has changed one of our neighbors' lives. And there are others, too. Some of them y'all may know about, others you may not. (Hopefully we can all recommit ourselves to sharing stories like these across our congregation!) But know this: every day, of every week, of every month, our HAB family is shining more and more light—and sharing more and more love—into the lives of our church members and our neighbors alike. And that's something that we should be proud of and grateful for, because I believe that it's something that our Lord is proud of and grateful for too.

Mission Moments

Sulzbacher

More than 20 years ago, when Sulzbacher began its program to feed the homeless, HAB was among the first groups to volunteer to assist with the project. We have been serving ever since. This year, for the first time, funding for the meals is not in HAB's budget but will come from donations which were pledged, over and above the tithes and offerings already being given to HAB, by members of our congregation. Eighteen members have pledged to contribute to provide the \$800 a month needed to purchase ingredients, which are then prepared, cooked, and served to between 250 and 300 homeless people each day that it is our turn to volunteer. The menu includes a tossed salad, applesauce, a stew of ground beef in tomato sauce with corn , beans, and onions over rice. Each month—and September is the first month under the new church budget year—HAB is responsible for the meal the third Monday of the month. This year there are 18 volunteer cooks and 12 servers. Cooks arrive at Sulzbacher at 3:00, and servers come at 5:00. Without these volunteers and contributors, Sulzbacher would not be able to feed their homeless that night. Those of us who volunteer are pleased to be able to do our part in this small way to help the homeless of Jacksonville.



Artist Lisa Lofton Evokes Florida's Vivid Past

Two-dimensional artist Lisa Lofton began painting and drawing as a youngster during her early Kentucky years. Her enthusiasm for Florida was sparked by childhood visits to grandparents. Enticed by vivid billboards and a dazzling state-line Welcome Center, Lisa fell under the spell of sunshine meeting water, orange groves, and magical tourist attractions.

Eventually Lisa relocated to Florida, studied architecture at the University of Florida, and then developed a career in computer technology, including a stint in graphic design. However, the focus of her professional life shifted dramatically in 2018 with a decision to create art full time. Lisa uses acrylic on



canvas as her primary medium. "I do like to create mixed media pieces as well, combining ink, charcoal, and acrylic. My images are illustrative and vibrant. With a background in architecture and drafting, I have a fondness for old buildings and functional objects with history, with a story."

The exhibit in HAB's narthex gallery, opening in October, features iconic images of mid-century Florida, including both original paintings and signed prints. The artist's intention is to engage the viewer personally. "My bright, illustrative



style invites an emotional connection to a time and place."

"My current series, *Vintage Florida*, was born out of a pandemic and the reminiscence of a carefree and joyful time of discovery in my life. [A diner placemat depiction of Florida was Lisa's specific inspiration for these images.] As a transplant in childhood, I saw the State of Florida as a wonderful adventure with so much to offer a visitor. Born in the 60's, many of my Florida pieces reflect memories of objects and places that have brought me a sense of happiness and peace. For me, painting is like reading a well-loved book, a vehicle for escapism when needed, and always a path to understanding myself and my surroundings.... I hope to revive fond memories for each viewer with my current series. Welcome to Florida and a Sunshine State of Mind!"
