Each month, when it comes time to write a Herald article, I have to decide what aspect of HAB's life I want to highlight for y'all. Sometimes that can be a difficult decision—Which mission? Which ministry? Which aspect of our life together?—but this month, it isn't hard at all. That's because, this month, I want to tell you all a story.

Earlier this year, an individual in the church reached out and said that she wanted to talk, so we scheduled a meeting, and she came to the church. When we sat down, she told me that she was already a regular contributor to HAB but that she'd just come into some unexpected funds and had decided to

donate a tithe, a tenth of it, to HAB on top of her regular giving.

Immediately, I thanked her for her generosity as a consistent giver and also for this extra gift on top of that, and I told her that I'd be happy to help her figure this out. She said that, because of her and her family's long involvement at HAB, there were three areas that she wanted to focus on, but within those areas she wanted some guidance. First, she wanted her gift to support Chelsea's work with the children's ministry. Second, she wanted to help Britt out with the youth. And third, she wanted a portion of her gift to support one of our church's mission partners. After some emails and a few more conversations, I'm very excited to let y'all know what was decided.

First, this gift will make all of Chelsea's outside activities free for children and their families for the rest of the year! After talking with Chelsea and hearing about the exciting plans she has for our HAB Kids ministry, she told me that she really wants to focus on developing community, within both children and young families at HAB, and also that she really wants to encourage folks to invite their friends to her ministry's events. However, as a mom, finances are always in the back of her mind because she knows what it feels like to be overwhelmed by the costs of extra-curricular activities for her own children. Therefore, this is how she's decided to use her funds: For the rest of the year, all outside children's activities will be totally and completely free, so young families don't need to be concerned about their expenses, and they have every reason to invite their friends to come take part in these events, too! This will allow this busy, over-stretched part of our church's community to come together, get to know one another better, and not have to worry about deciding whether it's worth one more "charge" on their credit cards!

Secondly, this gift will allow our youth group to go on a mission weekend next spring for a *significantly* reduced cost! Since the pandemic, Britt has had the youth group's mission work focused on local partners and areas of need here in Jacksonville. Some of this has been strategic—it's important for young people to get to know their community and serve their neighbors who are close at hand—but, at the same time, some of this has been needed. Passport, the summer camp that HAB's youth have been going to for years and years now, is increasingly expensive, and Britt didn't feel right asking families (especially families with sibling sets, like many of ours) to pay for two expensive trips every year. This year, however, because of this family's generosity, he's going to be able to take the youth group to rural South Carolina next February to work with Together for Hope... and it's just about all paid for! This trip will be an extraordinary opportunity for our youth group, and this is a great gift to their families and their friends' families!

Finally, \$3,000 of the donated funds will be going to our community partner, UCOM. As I noted above, this woman wanted to support one of our community partners, and we settled on UCOM because of its important work in our part of the city. Now, some of you are likely wondering, "Why didn't she just give the money straight to UCOM? Why run it through HAB?" It's a fair question, but there's actually a good reason. First, this woman wanted to tithe this gift to her church, as an act not just of gratitude but also of devotion to God. Secondly, however, she recognized that her appreciation for UCOM's work was tied into her Christian faith and therefore also tied into her life at HAB. In other words, it was important to her that this was a part of our congregation's communal support of this ministry. UCOM will still get 100% of the money (and, yes, she'll still get the same tax write-off for the donation), but what this action signals is that—more so than we do as individuals—we love our neighbors and support our partners as a church family. To be honest, a part of me wishes that more of us would do this. It would be a little more

paperwork for Darrell (sorry, Darrell), but it would better reflect our church's actual generosity towards our neighbors. So that's my story. Isn't it great!? To the family who gave this gift: Thank You So Much! The good that this gift will accomplish will ripple out in ways that none of us can anticipate. And to everyone else: Know that the giver of this gift has asked to remain anonymous. But all that means is that it really could be anyone: The person who sits next to you in worship, or serves with you on a team, or breaks bread with you on Wednesday nights.

And who knows...the next time a gift like this is given, it might even be you!




