

Saying Goodbye to One of Our Family By Anita Snell Daniels

My Army/Navy hymnal includes four full pages of precise instructions for the rituals of a Navy military funeral. Although majestic with ritual, I wasn't quite prepared for it at President Carter's funeral. You see, those trappings were not Jimmy Carter's usual setting—he was just a regular guy. Jack and I knew the Carters for many years, but our relationship was nothing unusual—they were open, approachable, comfortable folk in their relationships with everyone.

We first met Jimmy in 1969 when I was asked to sing at an event where he was speaking in his campaign for governor of Georgia. During his time serving as governor, we were privileged to be with the Carters on several occasions as Jack and Jimmy would be asked to help with events in the Newnan/Atlanta area. We spent a day at the opening of Power's Crossroads Art Festival in 1971. Jimmy was very encouraging to Jack as a young pastor, and a lasting friendship was formed. Through the years we stayed in touch through Habitat for Humanity and various trips to Plains with HAB folk.

We all paid attention to the continuing work that was being established through the Carter Center. The work was always for the betterment of humanity, but we saw the calling of Jesus Christ in the manner it was taking place. As a Baptist, Jimmy felt called to share the message of God's love, and he and Rosalynn chose action to share God's presence with the world.

When the wide spectrum of work of the Southern Baptist Convention imploded between the 80s and 90s, there was a call to form a new fellowship of Baptists. HAB sent a group of leaders to this first meeting in Atlanta. The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship (CBF)was formed, and Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter cast their lot with us as CBF Baptists. Since that time, they have been very supportive of The Fellowship.

Jack and I left HAB in 2000 to work with The Fellowship in Asia, developing partnerships to strengthen the work of Christians there. Our specific job, that held our visa in Singapore, was to help further train Baptist graduate students so that they would have the credentials and accreditation to train their own women and men to lead in their own culture. Yes, Jimmy Carter played a role in this area, too. I helped form delegations throughout Asia to visit our churches and institutions. President Carter helped by meeting large groups at the Carter Center and having me bring individuals to meet him in Plains. He was always an encourager. Throughout Jack's illness, Jack and I received a weekly letter from the Carters offering their prayers of encouragement.

As we watched all the pageantry and political swirls of the Carter funeral, the message was clear: Do justice, love mercy, walk humbly, and treat your neighbor as yourself.

Let us live out God's love!

We will miss you, brother-you were one of our family!



Mission Updates: Next Step Ministry by Debbie Crumb, Mission Team Leader

The Next Step Ministry at HAB was formed in 2019 by a group including Caroline and Lee Welkley, Debbie Hagan, and Rev. Kyle Reese.

Since its formation, this ministry has provided our neighbors assistance with obtaining SSI disability benefits, SNAP renewal (food stamps), HUD housing/rental assistance, Veterans' Benefits, and addressing immigration issues. It has also helped individuals with more direct assistance as well. For example, this past Christmas, the Next Step Ministry was able to provide several Walmart gift cards (\$50 each) to help our neighbors in need. These neighbors included a 62-year-old partially disabled woman with a mentally challenged teenage son; an immigrant family, with two young children, who was facing ICE and immigration issues; a young, single mom (with an infant son) working at a low-paying job (but grateful to have found a job after much searching!); a woman who was totally disabled and has great difficulty just moving around for necessary healthcare; and a single mom with ten-year-old and four-year-old boys. This is just a tiny, recent glimpse into the good work that this ministry has accomplished over the years.

Since the pandemic, **Caroline Welkley** has been the point person for the ministry. It is with sadness (for us) and joy



(for her), that we report that Caroline Welkley will soon be relocating to Dowling Park, Florida, to pursue her next phase of life.

During this transition period without Caroline, HAB plans to continue to identify individuals that may benefit from extra help (in addition to a bagged lunch) and help

those individuals reach out to UCOM and/ or the Urban Rest Stop bus from Sulzbacher for further assistance.

We want to thank Caroline for the passion, love, and hard work that she consistently demonstrates in the mission of providing a helping hand with the "next step" for our neighbors. She has truly been the hands of Christ in the lives of these people! Medical Debt Relief Update

Marsha Hatcher, a multidisciplinary visual artist who has exhibited her work and helped to build a more vibrant arts community in Northeast Florida for three decades, has been honored with the 2024 Ann McDonald Baker Art Ventures Award.

Marsha has traveled the world, and her art captures these diverse experiences. She has mastered several artistic media including oils, acrylic, wood and metal. She has exhibited her work in the Ritz Theatre & Museum, the Beaches Museum and History Park, Yellow House, and the Cummer Museum of Art & Gardens, among many others. She learned of the award in the fall at a surprise announcement at the office of The Community Foundation.



"I was elated, I was happy, I was thrilled," said Hatcher. "My first thought was, 'Why me?' I realize I do things for the community that I think are required. If you're part of the community, you know you have your roles in the community, so I do what I can to lift it up."

This year, the award provides a \$20,000 unrestricted grant, the largest of its kind in the region. It is bestowed annually in recognition of a gifted local artist whose work brings distinction to Northeast Florida.
