



Medical Debt Gratitude by B.J. Hutto, Senior Pastor

Friends,

As you all know, in the last half of last year, HAB partnered with a national organization, Undue Medical Debt (UMD), to buy up and forgive (erase) medical debt in and around Jacksonville. It was an initiative that our mission leadership had been working on and dreaming of for a while, and it was a step out in faith for our church to attempt it, trusting that our members—and our neighbors—would contribute to an effort to erase the debt of strangers.

It was also, by any measure, a resounding success. Instead of raising our goal of \$10,000, we raised over \$21,000, which allowed us to erase (forgive!) just about \$3.5 million of medical debt here in Northeast Florida. Again, hopefully you've seen the stats:

we bought and erased every dollar of medical debt that UMD had access to in Duval County and bought much of what they had in Baker, Nassau, St. Johns, and Clay counties. In all, over 2,500 families were impacted—truly, lives were changed—because of the generosity of Hendricks Avenue Baptist Church!

All of which is wonderful. But it's also a bit abstract. Statistics are important, but they can be difficult to appreciate because they're inherently impersonal. *Personal notes, however, are not*. So for my *Herald* article this month, I wanted to share a note that we received from one of our neighbors whose life we changed:

"I wanted to take just a moment to thank you for forgiving some of my medical debt. I was sent a letter by Undue Medical Debt, and though it's a small drop in a giant ocean of debt, it's still more than any other has done to help with this debt. I feel like it is the type of good works that we are called to do by Christ and am in tears as I write this message to you because it bothers me every day to be further from Christ than I would like to be. Just the reminder that I needed that God still watches over me... and though I am unable to attend church there because of finances and because I live in Middleburg, I wanted to reach out to the congregation at HAB and if only with a special message of thanks and of Gratitude and a Prayer for you all...GOD BLESS you all!!! Know that your offerings and kindness DO make a difference...I am a testament of how you've touched my broken heart and my soul...personally in MY LIFE. The fact that you all cared the way GOD has commanded us to do for others restores faith for me in God and in people so much right now! I pray that God protects you all and will watch over you and bless you all in your lives so that you may continue helping others with such great faith-restoring hope. May these unspoken deeds and blessings lead us all to his feet!"

My friends, there it is: not just a burden of debt lifted but a life touched. A child of God reminded that they are loved, and that they are neither forgotten nor alone in their struggles. Because of what we have done, someone out in Middleburg—and 2,500 of their neighbors all around us—have been given a tangible expression of God's grace.

So thank you all! Not just for doing this great and good deed, but more importantly for being the kind of people—the kind of Christians—who are willing to truly show love for the stranger.

He has resided at Riverside Park Apartments for over five years. Jerry says that the warmth of HAB members at his arrival made him want to be a part of our community.




CBF Georgia Senior Adult Retreat May 4-7 By Jon Yost

On Saturday, March 8, a group of students and adults from HAB gathered in the St. Nicholas area of our city to paint a house. The house belongs to the Moh Loh family, who recently relocated to Jacksonville from Myanmar. We learned about the family from our ministry partner, Safe Havens Ministries—a ministry devoted to helping the poorest of the poor families and individuals settle into a home that will be a "Safe Haven."

After hearing about the need, members of our Mission Team—particularly Melanie Wilson and Debbie Crumb—began exploring ways our church could serve. Lynn Bledsoe, Executive Director of Safe Havens Ministries, coordinated with Melanie and Debbie to set up a project that would benefit the family and be physically and economically feasible for our church. Following multiple conversations, it was decided that painting the house fit the bill.

Perhaps what was not accounted for in our planning was how difficult it would be to gather a group of volunteers! After all, Saturdays are protected days for most people. Plus, many of our

students are involved with sports, theater, Scouts, and more on weekends. Yet, despite the challenge, a small but mighty team showed up to offer their time and energy to serve their neighbors.

Admittedly, as our team examined the house and size of our group, we wondered if we would be able to complete the project. Prior to our arrival, the home was pressure washed by Byers Machine Power Clean. As you can see in the before and after photos, there was quite a bit of mildew that had formed on the exterior of the home. If the



exterior had not been washed, we might not have completed the task!

Despite the inevitable obstacles that come with any endeavor, though, our team got to work. Over the course of six hours, our students and adults worked together to paint the entirety of this home. We did not possess fancy

tools or much experience, but we did have time and a heart full of love. And sometimes that is all that is needed to make a difference.

The great temptation of our times is believing we must do something remarkable to make a difference.
